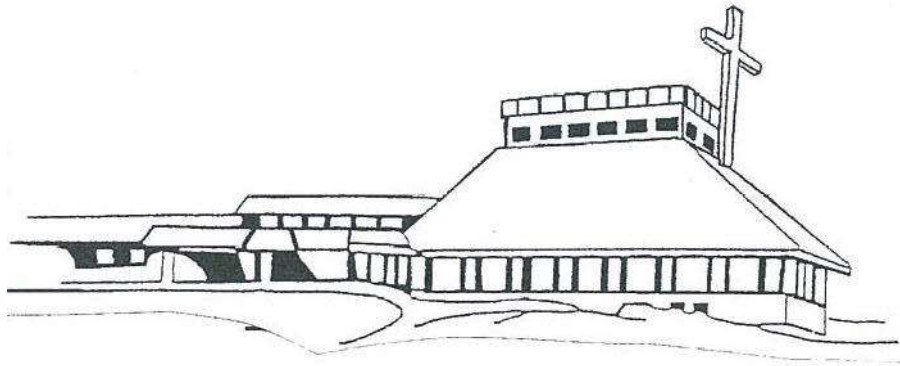

The Congregation of the First Presbyterian Church, Horseheads, NY held its Annual meeting on Sunday, January 28, 2018 in the sanctuary.

1. Call to Order

- Meeting was called to order at 11:25 by Moderator of Session, Rev. Dr. Cheryl Ann Elfond.
- Clerk announced that notification of this meeting was done twice, prior to today's meeting.
- A reading of the 2017 Necrology report was offered, Konrad Jessup (June 6), Dick Ziegler (August 5), Wandah Smith (August 22), Pat Hauser (August 30), Al Dalrymple (October 19) and Addie Kelley (November 5) were remembered.
- A quorum was present with approximately 41 members attending.
- Motion to approve the agenda was made by Doug Day, seconded by Alan Hutchinson, approved.
- The minutes of the 2017 Congregational meeting were waived at that meeting to be approved by the Session at the regular session meeting in February 2017.

2. Reports of the Committees and Ministries

- A. The clerk reviewed the membership statistics. A written report was provided to the congregation. The number of active members at the beginning of the year was 140 and ended with 121.
- B. Reports of the Committees were available to the congregation and an opportunity for comments and questions was given.

Election of Officers – Doug Day on behalf of the Nominating Committee, nominated the following:

- Elders to serve a 3 year term: Doug Laney, Art Wolfe and Marty Oldfield. No nominations were offered from the floor. A motion to close the nominations was made by Barb Clark, seconded by Guy Stillman, approved. The motion to accept the nominees from the committee was approved.
- Deacons to serve a 3 year term: Gale Howard, Alan Hutchinson, Jan Stillman and Judy Sell. No nominations were offered from the floor. A motion to close the nominations was made by Marty Oldfield, seconded by Lorraine Price, approved. The motion to accept the nominees from the committee was approved.
- Auditing Committee for a 3 year term: Joe Matejka. A motion to close the nominations was made by Jim McIntosh, seconded by Judy McIntosh, approved. The motion to accept the nominees from the committee was approved.
- Nominating Committee for a 1 year term: Gene Herber, Judy McIntosh, Doug Laney and Gale Howard - (Deacon Representative). No nominations came from the floor. A motion to close the nominations was made by Alan Hutchinson, seconded by Ellen Benedict, approved. The motion to accept the nominees from the committee was approved.

Doug also noted: Clerk of Session – Mary Yoder, Treasurer – Doug Laney, Assistant Treasurer – Beverly Flisnick, and Delegate to Presbytery – Bob Sell.

Finance - Judy McIntosh reviewed the 2017 financials including the Balance sheet as of December 31, 2017 stating there was an expected shortage of fund was not as extensive as predicted due to some members paying some or all of their 2018 pledges in December because of the impending 2018 Tax Code changes. So the year ended with only a (\$392.00) deficit. The 2018 budget, previously approved by session was made available to the congregation and time was made available for questions. Judy

states that again this year there is a deficit budgeted for 2018. The audit report performed on May 11, 2017 for the 2016 fiscal year was made available to the congregation. Two recommendations were made. 1. The Mission Committee Chair should review and approve vouchers related to the Community dinner, to add a layer of proper review. 2. Two people should count loose Sunday offering. Recommending the head usher be that second person. No discrepancies were found.

A motion to accept the committee reports was made by Doug Day and seconded by Paul Yoder, approved.

3. New and Other Business

Recognition of 50 years members – A list of persons who have been members for 50 years or more was read by the Clerk.

A motion to accept the revision of the bylaws previously approved by Session was made by Allen Oldfield, seconded by Jim Ellison, approved.

4. The Pastor's Annual Report - Rev. Dr. Cheryl Ann Elfond spoke regarding the Pastor's report and the future story workgroup. Stating First Presbyterian Church of Horseheads Future Story was summarized in the statement attached in the Annual meeting docket for all to read. Opportunities for mission inside and outside of our congregation have presented themselves through Cheryl Ann and the Mission committee, working with Mary Shrock, Arnot Medical Center on planning for our individual futures such as health care proxy and financial planning, and Christian education at Appleridge. An opportunity for the Congregation to ask questions was given.

5. Approval of Minutes

Gene Herber moved and Judy McIntosh seconded to have the Session approve the minutes of the annual meeting at its next regular meeting, approved.

7. Motion to Adjourn

Allen Oldfield moved and Beverly Flisnick seconded the motion to adjourn the meeting. approved.

The Congregation meeting was adjourned with the Charge and Benediction by the Rev, Dr. Cheryl Ann Elfond at 11:54 a.m.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS 2018 YEARLY REPORT

The Buildings and Grounds Committee of the First Presbyterian Church of Horseheads has the responsibility of maintaining the church structure and its surrounding grounds for the use by the congregation and outside Community Groups. These include: Nursery School, Food Pantry, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Community Orchestra, Crystal Chords, and The County Board of Elections. We also host a monthly community dinner.

This year buildings & grounds has taken care of the following items:

1. We continue to change over to LED lighting in both our inside and outside lighting fixtures which results a substantial electrical savings (around 80 percent).
2. Replacement of ballasts and fluorescent bulbs in our aging fixtures.
3. Repairs to the shingled areas of our roof.
4. Road banks have been cleared of overgrowth & debris
5. Parking lot was repaired with driveway patchwork (20 bags).
6. Added a second monitor to make it easier for the secretary.
7. Inside and outside cleaning of church Windows by Bharat
8. The yearly pruning and maintenance of the outdoor shrubs and atrium Plantings has been completed.
9. Judy Sell has continued to maintain and update the Atrium.
10. The replacement of door lock and painting of Choir Room door by Allen Oldfield.

I would like to extend my gratitude to all the members of our committee for their dedication and help in maintaining the church building and grounds. A special thank you to Jim McIntosh (mowing), Doug Day(blacktop patch & brush hauling), Judy Sell and Marty Oldfield for Atrium care. Your efforts do not go unnoticed and are greatly appreciated.

Deacons provide coffee Hour on the first Sunday of each month, and, on the same Sunday, the Deacons provide two greeters and two Communion servers. In addition, the linens are changed according to the liturgical calendar.

Other services provided for our church members include: Easter flowers and Christmas poinsettias delivered to our homebound or nursing home members. We had 22 at Easter and 17 at Christmas. In addition, we provided two funeral lunches and one reception. The Deacons sponsored having Mary Schrock, a social worker at Arnot Health, to come and give a presentation about long term care issues during a Worship service in June.

The Deacons provide ongoing care for those on our Care Lists. We added Caring Friends this year. This is a person who often calls on some of our shut-ins anyway. They can relieve the Deacons from some of the calling and delivering of flowers. We have added two members from the Westminster Church to our shut-in list. One is at Appleridge and the other is at Bethany Courtyards. This was requested from the Westminster Church as they were closing. We work with the pastor and appreciate Cheryl Ann's guidance and involvement in our ongoing work.

At Christmas time, the Deacons gave a gift card to a needy individual.

Thank you to each Deacon for their ongoing care for those on their Care Lists and for the teamwork that we continue to experience.

MISSION COMMITTEE – SUB COMMITTEE REPORT

FREE COMMUNITY DINNERS 2018

Free Community Dinners were held each month on the second Friday, January through December. Our 7th year was completed in May of 2018. The average attendance each month was about 85 persons including the staff, with 95 during December. The months of June, July, August and September were picnic style dinners. Our Saviour's Lutheran Church still co-sponsors the dinners with us. Some help in the meal planning, some come and help serve. The participation from Our Saviour's has decreased some due to illness and issues beyond their control. Our Saviour's continues to donate \$100 each month toward the food expense.

Money that is donated at each meal continues to be given to the Horseheads Food Pantry. An average of \$175 or more is received each month. Over \$2000 was donated in 2018. The average cost of each month's meal varies depending on the menu. Most run about \$150. A small request in the month of December for a couple of low cost turkeys, resulted in 5 turkeys, a large amount of squash and other items being donated by multiple members of our congregation. The food pantry supplies bread when they have an abundance. We have begun to record the statistics of zip codes where attendees live, age groups and male/female ratios. We will use this data to do the appropriate paper work to be able to participate in purchasing supplies from the Food Bank of the Southern Tier.

The Preschool continues to be one of the many fine programs at the Horseheads Presbyterian Church. The dedication and commitment from the staff maintains the high-quality program under a very small budget. Our preschool program is well recognized in the community and we believe that the children are well prepared for kindergarten while allowing them to be children.

May 2018, the Nursery School held their Graduation Ceremony on Wednesday May 23rd. Twenty five children were enrolled in our program and participated in the ceremonies. We had a successful year academically and financially.

June 2018 We ran a week long “camp” for 15 children. We used the kitchen to make “bear” biscuits and blueberry muffins, played outside, hiked and sang in the atrium and had s’mores in the chapel with our tent and “camp fire”. It was the most fun ever!!!

September 2018 We started the school year off with 22 children enrolled, but one later dropped out. Two teachers retired in May and we replaced one, so our staff consists of 4 teachers with Kathy playing the dual role of teacher and director. With the change in the director/teacher position and a raise in tuition, we are making ends meet financially.

My first year as director, as well as teaching, has been challenging, but rewarding. Everyone has been very helpful with the transition including Tammy Joensen! We are still operating a M-W-F program 9-11:30 am.

We have many visitors throughout the year. To name a few: the Horseheads Village Fire Department, Dr. Baker from Gentle Family Dentistry and C.I.D.S Some of our activities for the year include wearing our pj’s, breakfast at school and our many parties to celebrate *every* occasion!

Thank you to everyone for your continued support of *your* Preschool. Thank you to Building and Grounds personel for keeping us warm, well lit and the plumbing running smoothly. We will continue to do our very best promoting the Preschool for many years! ☺

Our meetings consist of a brief devotional, prayer, review of the PIFs we read at home the preceding week, phone calls with candidates, developing candidate specific questions for phone or face to face interviews and discussion of our discernment. We are still looking for the candidate God is preparing for our Congregation and appreciate all your prayers and patience.

John 15:12

“This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you.

When I think about First Presbyterian Church of Horseheads (FPH), I think about love. Indeed, the Mission Statement adopted by the Session and Congregation speaks directly to love:

We seek to show Christ’s love through our actions by:

- Ministering to our Community – helping those in need as Christ taught us
- Ministering to our Members – providing support and fellowship
- Ministering to our Souls – offering Christ-centered Worship and Education

But, it is not the Mission Statement that brings love to mind; it is the everyday encounters with the people of FPH. Personally, I have experienced the grace and love of the congregation during the time of my father’s illness and then at the time of his death. I cannot remember a Sunday when someone did not ask me about my father and tell me they were praying for him. When my father died, members of the congregation sent me cards and gave me hugs. One member consoled me by telling me that she still misses her parents after all of these years. Thank you so much for your Christian love and concern. It really made a difference during my time of personal need and grief.

One of a pastor’s worst nightmares is to lose one’s voice. That happened to me on the First Sunday of Advent; a communion Sunday. Leaders in the congregation stepped up to the plate and led the entire service except communion when I used the small voice that was beginning to return after a week of silence. I met with members and others while on continuing voice rest writing my responses on paper. Thank you for your understanding and patience.

That is just my experience. I witness the graciousness of the congregation as it cares for people: members, visitors, strangers near and far. The heart of the congregation is one of grace and love.

Members and friends alike serve in many capacities in the congregation. The service is done in love and without fanfare. Many spend countless hours giving of their time and talent.

It is my pleasure to serve with the Session, the Deacons, the various committees, Dan LaBar, and Brenda Fasick. In reflecting on the last year of ministry, I want to highlight worship, pastoral care, mission, and administration.

WORSHIP

For the second year in a row, the congregation shared worship with the United Methodist Church in July and August. Even though there is a time and building change (for August), everyone loves the summer worship and it is fun!

This year, a monthly service of worship with communion was added at Appleridge. This was a first step at implementing a part of the Future Story Vision. On the first Sunday of the month, I provide an abbreviated worship service with sermon and communion for FPH’s “second congregation” at Appleridge. This congregation has grown steadily from 11 in attendance to 21 in attendance.

The Deacons have helped with this ministry; in fact, without their help and in particular Gale Howard who has prepared communion most months, this ministry would not be possible. Several members have assisted in worship and led worship with Ellen Benedict working with the Rev. Dr. Paul Green and Bob Sell subbing when I was on vacation and Judy Sell stepping in as liturgist when I was without voice. Thank you, thank you!

PASTORAL CARE

In the past year, there have been many hospitalizations of members and friends and there are been 10 deaths including the deaths of 5 former members or friends of the church. There are many who are not able to attend church for various reasons. Pastoral care is a high priority of the congregation and is a constant. The Pastor cannot do this ministry alone. The Deacons and the Pastor together provide care for members and friends of the church alike.

The heart of the pastoral care is the ministry of the Deacons. I am thankful for the steady ministry of the Deacons. I have never seen a board of Deacons work as well as this one and do so much. Thank you, thank you!

MISSION

Wow! FPH engages in mission beyond what its size would otherwise suggest. From the Food Pantry, to the Preschool, to the Monthly Community Meals, to the many organizations it supports and the many hands on mission projects in which it participates, the congregations lives and breathes mission. To the Mission committee and all who participate in the work: Thank you, thank you!

ADMINISTRATION

Administration can often be a thankless task but it is necessary. FPH is blessed with the capable services of its volunteer Treasurer Doug Laney and the assistant Treasurers Bev Flisnick and Pam Kline. The Administration committee does the work of 3 former committees: finance, personnel, and stewardship and they keep things running smoothly. Thank you, thank you!

The Building and Grounds committee has responsibility not only for care of the building and grounds (which is no small task) but also for the use of the building which is a very time consuming task. They do the maintenance in the church and care for the lawn and grounds saving the church countless expenses. How do they do it all? They just do. Thank you, thank you!

TRANSITION

As the Pastor Nominating Committee works on behalf of the congregation in search of the next installed Pastor, I want to encourage the congregation to continue to offer their prayers and support and to keep moving forward in ministry. Now is not the time to sit back and let things slide, it is the time to actively engage in ministry and to periodically reassess what you are doing. As I wrote last year in the Pastor's annual report, "Pastors are attracted to churches that are active; not churches that put their ministry on hold."

It has been my privilege to serve with you in ministry this past year. The faith commitment and spiritual depth of the congregation is truly an inspiration.
